Artists Help Youth in Foster Care Find Their Superhero


A group of community artists are helping Cuyahoga County youth in foster care find their inner superhero



With Lisa's creative assistance, I have been able to bring The Superhero Project to life for my fifth grade students and fellow staff members for the past three years!

This is a rare experience where we have displayed the Look at Me traveling exhibit in our own special school spaces. It has allowed students and visitors the chance to not only view and appreciate the Superhero Project posters and read all about addition, we have expanded the experience by hosting virtual enrichment activities as well. In with Lisa, Taryn, and artists, and hosted guest speakers (including two featured superheroes) in person!

Students have written letters to their favorite superheroes, and a few were beyond surprised to receive a letter in return. The best part of our experience is when students create their very own superhero alter ego posters and accompanying adventure stories. The children become so engaged in this experience - I have literally never seen a connection like this in my 26 years of teaching. Through this unique opportunity, students grow socially and emotionally, show empathy and compassion for differences, are empowered and inspired to draw out and celebrate their own inner strengths, practice gallery etiquette, and gain a deeper appreciation for art.

When I see my former students, they always say, "Remember the superheroes? That was my favorite part about 5th Grade!" I know it will always be my favorite, too.




